#### MICHIGAN LAKES AND STREAMS FALL MEETING

Michigan Lakes and Streams Association Region 3 lake representatives met at the Webster Memorial Library in Decatur, MI on September 25<sup>th</sup> for a round table discussion about current issues of importance to southwest Michigan waterways. The meeting was moderated by Sue Vomish, President of the MLSA and Region 3 representative. There were 26 people in attendance, representing 18 lakes. These lakes were Indian, Big Fish, Finch, Birch, Three Mile, Magician, Gravel, Little Fish, Gourdneck, Bankson, Brownwood, Wahbememe, Little Paw Paw, Reynolds, Baldwin, Shavehead, Cable and Twin Lakes. Each representative spoke about their lake and shared their issues, successes and concerns so that everyone could learn and help each other.

Year in and year out associations tackle the issue of membership, and every year presents the challenge of how to keep old members and entice new ones. There are a few lakes that have a high percentage of paid members, but there are many that struggle. All lake residents are the recipients of the work done by board members and committee volunteers and unfortunately too few are willing to pay the small annual dues to support these efforts. Apathy seems to be a contributing factor as well as a misunderstanding of the importance of an organized, informed and active lake association. Often it is the same people year after year who attend meetings, pay dues and volunteer to help. Without these people many lake associations would fold from lack of interest. One area lake association did so this past year.

Managing invasive plants and monitoring lake water quality continues to be a main topic of discussion. Some lakes have been treating invasive plants for many years and others are still in the process of researching treatment alternatives and contracting professional lake management companies. There are a few lakes that monitor water quality and treat invasive plants in-house, but most lakes have resorted to hiring outside firms and to set up a Special Assessment District through their township(s). A new invasive plant that has been seen in area waters is Starry Stonewort. This plant seems to prefer a silt lake bottom and calm water, often the environment found in lake channels, and it is spread by waterfowl.


There are lakes that are seeing an increase in algae blooms, both toxic and non-toxic varieties. Increases in algae are caused by higher nutrient levels in the water. Nutrient levels increase with changes in the watershed. Lakes are being overdeveloped and this alters shorelines and wetlands that have always been the natural cleanser of the water. Lawn fertilizers and ash seeping into the lake are also contributing factors to nutrient increases. Nature also plays its part, warmer water is the perfect environment for algae growth as well as the cycle of plant life as it dies each year and falls to the lake bottom and decays.

Many associations have realized the importance of understanding their township zoning ordinances and attending township board meetings. Knowing your township officials and having a working relationship with them is a must for all associations. Lakes have seen many changes over the years but these current economic times may see associations dealing with new issues. Increases in vacant homes, rental properties, abandoned animals, septic tank neglect, improper waste/garbage disposal and theft are some of the areas where problems may arise and an association may need the help of the township to resolve these issues.

The use of lake bubblers for keeping the water open around piers in the winter months is seeing an increase. This practice is great for the resident that does not wish to remove a pier but it creates dangers for ice fisherman and snowmobilers, and causes the surrounding ice to remain thin and dangerous. Thin ice also allows sunlight to reach the lake bottom and encourages weed growth. Also open water keeps waterfowl in the area and they contribute their waste to the lake water year round. It is very important for the lake to freeze over every winter.

The meeting was three hours of interesting conversation and great ideas to better our lake associations. Sue Vomish closed the meeting reminding everyone that lake associations have a responsibility to educate residents about lake preservation and sound environmental practices, and to remember that we are privileged to live on these lakes and we owe something back to them.
